

I believe what makes New York State strong are the opportunities available to all individuals to have gainful employment and a meaningful impact on the communities that we all live and work in. Unfortunately, too often, those in society who need additional supports or accommodations are not able to participate in these work opportunities and the rewards and self-esteem associated with gainful employment. The Preferred Source program has been widely successful in allowing individuals, regardless of their disability, to participate in the workforce while getting the supports necessary to be successful. This program has been a hallmark of New York State's commitment to people with disabilities and has positively impacted countless individuals and their families by providing meaningful employment opportunities.

Approval of the NYSID application would simply allow the Preferred Source program to recognize that technology has changed how documents are delivered, and that State government agencies want a "one stop" service that prints and mails documents. This digital print application allows for state agencies to meet their objectives, limits the scope of work to print associated with mail fulfillment, and allows employment opportunities for people with disabilities to be maintained.

Dear Mr. Carroll:

I write this letter in support of the mail fulfilment application that is currently before the NYS Procurement Council. This application would allow printing, in a very limited and defined scope to be included as a preferred source offering through the NYS Industry for the Disabled. Mail fulfilment is an important job that offers individuals with specific disabilities a living wage.

The scope of the work included in this application limits the printing to jobs that NYSID member agencies currently provide mail fulfillment services for. In other words, rather than the state agency printing a document and sending it by truck to the NYSID member agency, they would receive an electronic version of the same document and would print, insert, and mail it. Currently, I do not believe any of this work is performed by private industry, and I do not anticipate any work, currently being done by private printers, will be lost by approval of this application.

This application, if approved, will help secure employment for individuals with disabilities, and will prevent the loss of jobs for both disabled and non-disabled workers.

I would appreciate your favorable consideration of this application. Thank you for your attention to this matter.


